## **Executive Summary**



The year 2016 is a witness of the commitment of the University of Rizal System to fulfill its mandate, and of the continuously evolving efforts to provide the relevant support mechanisms for the holistic development of our students, enabling research and extension environment, and feasible production activities.

As can be deduced in this report, notable accomplishments have been reckoned by the University through the dynamic and collective efforts of the management, faculty, staff and community stakeholders with the strong support of the Board of Regents. Major final outputs for the year and other accomplishments are the highlights of the University's achievements.

In instruction, enrolment for SY 2016-2017 registered a total of 22,479 students for first semester while 21,887 students in the second semester across the ten campuses of the university. 10.35% (4,591) of the total student population were recipients of scholarships and financial assistance. A total of 4,295 have graduated from various courses and among the first takers in various licensure examinations, 605 successfully passed and became new professionals. In November 2016, the university was adjudged as Top 6 performing school in the Civil Engineering Licensure Examination by the Philippine Regulations



Commission (PRC) while it produced top 2 in the Licensure Examinations for Teachers. Likewise, some students also passed different Technical Education and Skills Development Authority skills assessment tests and actively participated and won prestigious awards in numerous competi-

tions in academic, culture and arts, and sports.

In its quests for excellence, the University has continuously subjected its programs to AACCUP Accreditation and CHED recognition. It has initiated the preparation towards improving its processes within the context of International Organization for Standardization (ISO). It has also conducted an orientation among its faculty and staff about ISO 9001:2008, organized its ISO Team and has developed its Quality Policy, Quality Objectives and Work Instructions.

In anticipation of the chain effects of the K to 12 program, the university has created and launched the Curriculum and Instruction Unit and General Education Center. The unit has so far accomplished the formulation of an OBE syllabi in new General Education subjects, reviewed the qualifications of the faculty, prepared the prospectus of the New General Education Subjects and crafted the proposal for the establishment of the General Education Center in every campus.

The Library as an important component of instruction has upgraded its library holdings by purchasing additional books, subscription to the electronic library (IPEL) of CHED, and updating of the STARBOOKS. Its services were modernized through the acquisition of new furnitures, installation of area network and adoption of KOHA.

In research and extension, a significant increase in the number of proposed and completed RDE projects had been observed due to the continued provision of the needed financial and administrative supports for the conduct of research and extension activities, presentation of RDE papers in various scientific fora, publication of RDE papers, and copyrighting and patenting of research outputs. Likewise, corresponding presentation and publication incentives were given to researchers and extensionists. A total of 26 and 20 research and extension projects respectively were completed for the year. Forty-four research papers were presented in different scientific conferences, fora and local in-house reviews while 20 extension papers were presented in international and regional conferences. The extension services which involved livelihood, literacy, capability trainings, organic farming, environmental protection, and alternative learning system benefited a total of 3,842 community folks.

A number of faculty members received awards for the knowledge and technology generated and significant contributions of extension endeavors in different venues and categories. Also, two utility models developed by the faculty had been filed for patenting while 26 scholarly works received copyright registration and International Standard Book Number (ISBN).

## **Executive Summary**



The University has implemented various infrastructure projects and procured various laboratory equipment to effect better learning environment and enhanced research and extension conditions. Moreover, the administration through the approval of the BOR has appointed 99 faculty members and 26 staff to the next higher position. Hardworking and deserving faculty and staff as well as performing units were given due recognition during the annual PRAISE awarding ceremonies while Performance Based Bonus was also given to the regular employees. To hone the potentials and capability of the employees, a significant number of faculty and staff had attended various conferences and trainings in different venues aside from attending the in-service trainings conducted by the University. Part-time and full time scholarships were also given to several faculty in attending graduate programs.

The University served as the host of the 2016 Southern Tagalog Regional Association of State Universities and Colleges (STRASUC) Sports Olympics where more than 3,000 athletes, coaches and officials from 11 SUCs from Region IV-A & B actively participated in the weeklong sports event. It also provided leadership in the implementation of various programs and projects of the Center for Migration and Development (CMD) for Rizal province. This is a project initiated by the National Economic Development Authority (NEDA) Region IV-A to facilitate the provision of services to Overseas Filipino Workers (OFWs) and their families and in promoting enhanced consistency of interventions to address all concerns arising from migration and development. On the other hand, URS was recognized by the CALABARZON Regional Development Council as First Runner-Up in GAD Implementation in SUCs Category in 2015 due to its vibrant and visible activities on Gender and Development (GAD) within the academe as well as in extending technical services to other agencies and organizations in CALABARZON.

The university has sustained its linkages with other agencies and organizations and unceasingly established partnerships and collaborations at the international, national and local levels to gain various forms of support towards improving the delivery of its services as it continuously nurtures tomorrow's noblest.



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#### **URS Then & Now**



he University of Rizal System is a merger of two (2) state colleges and a university extension campus - the Rizal Polytechnic College, Rizal State College, and Rizal Technological University extension campus. The Republic Act 9157 lapsed into law on August 11, 2001, established a state university in the Province of Rizal to be known as the University of Rizal System, by integrating the Rizal State College and its extension campuses in Angono, Binangonan, Pililla and Rodriguez; the Rizal Polytechnic College and its extension campus in Cainta and Rizal Technological University-Antipolo Annex, all in the Province of Rizal. On June 18, 2002, CHED Resolution No. 411-2002 was issued identifying Tanay Campus as the main campus of the University.

The Rizal National Agricultural School (RNAS) was established by Republic Act No. 1560 authored by Cong. Serafin Salvador, which was approved on June 16, 1956. RNAS was opened on May 27, 1959. It was chartered as a state college on June 24, 1983 by Batas Pambansa Bilang 622 authored by Assemblyman Frisco F. San Juan making it the first state college in the Province of Rizal known as Rizal College of Agriculture and Technology (RCAT). RCAT was later renamed Rizal State College (RSC) by virtue of Republic Act 7858 sponsored by Hon. Congressman Emigdio S. Tanjuatco Jr. and approved by His Excellency Fidel V. Ramos on January 21,

1995.

The College is about 67 kilometers away from Metro Manila and accessible to all towns of Rizal through the Manila East Road or through Marikina-Infanta highway and is set atop an elevation of about 1,800 feet above sea level in the Sierra Madre Mountain range and is overlooking the scenic Laguna Lake and the surrounding lake towns.

Rizal Polytechnic College was first established as Morong High School on August 16, 1944. It was converted into Morong National High School

on August 20, 1976 and to Morong National Comprehensive School on March 30, 1977. With the integration of Tomas Claudio Memorial Elementary School, it was converted into Morong National Comprehensive School, later renamed Rizal Technological and Polytechnic Institute on August 10, 1983 through Batas Pambansa Bilang 469. RTPI became a state college, the Rizal Polytechnic College on March 1, 1995 through Republic Act 7933. Through Board of Trustees Resolution No.06-13-98 dated February 12, 1998, RPC Cardona Research Extension was established.



At present the University operates with ten campuses in the Province of Rizal, namely: URS Angono, Antipolo City, Binangonan, Cainta, Cardona, Morong, Pililla, Rodriguez, Tanay and Taytay. It offers complete quality education from Kindergarten to Graduate School. The University implements a number of academic programs in the doctorate, masters', baccalaureate, non-degree and short-term courses. It also provides research, extension and production services as well as establishment of centers. The existence of the University caters to the needs of the stakeholders within and nearby provinces.

#### **Enrolment Profile**



he University has a total enrolment of 22, 479 for the First Semester of School Year 2016-2017 which is 17.28 percent lower than that of the First Semester of School Year 2015-2016 due to the first year implementation of the Senior High School (SHS) program. The SHS was opened in three (3) URS Campuses such as Antipolo City, Morong, and Tanay which registered 480 students. The Second Semester enrolment for SY 2016-2017 is 21,887.

## Performance in Licensure Examination



n the November 2016 Licensure Examination for Civil Engineers, the University of Rizal System was proclaimed Top 6 performing school with 50 or more examinees category by the Philippine Regulations Commission (PRC). Out of 46 who took the examination, 42 were able to make it giving a passing rate of 91.3%.

Ms. Ludelyn Asuncion Palma of URS Antipolo is Top 2 in the September 2016 Licensure Examination for Elementary Teachers.

For this year, performance of the first-

time takers that registered a passing rate higher than the National Passing Rate are: Civil Engineers – 91.3%, Electrical Engineers – 90.32%, Electronics Technicians – 91.3%, Mechanical Engineers – 87.10%, Master Plumbers – 44.44%, Agricultural Engineers – 57.14%, and Elementary Teachers – 58.85%.

#### **URS Morong Campus is ranked 127th in the 2016 Philippine Universities Ranking**

n the ranking of Philippine Universities conducted by FindUniversity.ph, the University of Rizal System Morong Campus, Morong, Rizal ranked 127th among the Philippine Universities evaluated based on aggregated passing rates of each school in all board exams that their graduates participated in. Moreover, URS Morong Campus is ranked 23rd in CALABARZON and 2nd in Rizal

The evaluation considered the following criteria: aggregate passing rates of each school in each board exam in the past four (4) years; only first-timers were counted; schools that had a total of less than ten (10) examinees (first timers) for a particular board exam during the past four (4) exams were not ranked for that specific exam; and schools that were ranked in at least seven board examinations were considered.


## Student Scholarships



or the present school year, First and second semesters, scholarships and financial assistance are provided to a total of 4591 students which is about 10.35% of the total population of students in the University. Two hundred seventy-one (271) or 6% are from non-

government or private sponsors, one thousand one hundred twenty three (1,123) or 24% are University-funded and three thousand one hundred ninety-seven (3,197) equivalent to 70% are government scholars.

The scholarships and grants came from 16 scholarships under the University Scholarship Program that includes entrance scholarship, academic scholarship and service scholarships; 61 government scholarships and 43 non-government organizations scholarships, alumni scholarships and personal or private sponsors.

### Library Services



Il campus libraries had modernized its services through improvement of library furniture, installation of local area network, adoption of KOHA, and upgrading of DOST – STARBOOKS. To augment library holdings, they subscribed to the electronic library (IPEL) which was offered free through the Comission on Higher Education (CHED). The Library established its website and Facebook page for the announcement of activities and other informational resources. Five (5) campuses already have active websites operating while the five others are developing

their own. A Library Users Database that contains all information of library users especially students enrolled in URS Tanay provides efficient and accurate library usage statistics reports. Moreover, to increase the seating capacity and at least get closer to the prescribed library seating capacity, URS Tanay extended its space by enclosing with steel grills the adjacent open space at the back. With this expansion, it can already accommodate 117 users at a given time.

The DOST-STARBOOKS portal which was installed in all campus libraries was also updated.

Dr. Marita R. Canapi gave a testimonial on the benefits gained from DOST-STARBOOKS during the Super STARBOOKS Launch on July 29, 2016 at DOST Science & Technology Informationn Institute Auditorium, Taguig City. Penaranda was also invited for a recorded video interview by DOST CALABARZON.

## RESEARCH & DEVELOPMENT, EXTENSION AND PRODUCTION

The University of Rizal System is mandated to engage in research to generate new knowledge and technology which are compliant to sustainable development. The University is also required to deliver extension services through various modalities so that these research outputs are utilized to improve the welfare and productivity of the rural poor so that they become empowered and active partners for development.

For CY 2016, the University has attained its target in terms of its major final outputs in research and extension services. This is a result of the sustained provision of financial and technical supports by the administration which motivated the faculty members to actively engage in research and extension activities.

Morgover, the University also runs production projects on animal and crops to generate additional income. The same projects also serve as field laboratories of students.



To get the chromosome, multiply sound mask to random generated matrix using equation (1).



crops; producing rice especially functional rice; and identifying commodities with competitive advantage in the market.



## **Environmental Education and Biodiversity Research Center**



he Environmental Education and Biodiversity Research Center was formerly known as the Ecological and Biodiversity Research Center. Since its founding date, the Center has been in the forefront of environmental stewardship in the University. It has facilitated various environmental activities across the ten (10) campuses and has extended assistance to community undertakings in terms of ecological researches and conduct of information-dissemination campaign. It has emphasized the need to understand and appreciate the role of the University in nurturing the noblest environmental stewards.

For the year 2016, the Center has the following remarkable accomplishments:

#### **Environmental Education**

Information education campaign activities were conducted among members of the academe, households, business, women, tourism, agricultural and transport groups. This aimed to encourage their full participation in environmental management and fulfill the University's role in nurturing the noblest environmental stewards. The 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual University Environment Week celebration with the theme "Unifying Efforts to Avert Unlawful Trade in Wildlife" held on November 14-18, 2016 wrapped up the environmental education undertakings of



he SANRI Management Team and selected project assistants also participated in the 2016 Agrilink and Agualink Exhibition and Seminars on October 6-8, 2016, at World Trade Center, Pasay City. SANRI also served as venue for the conduct of 2016 1st Agency In-House Review of Completed and Research on January 29, 2016 and Workshop-Training on Technology in the Piloting of Soybean Production and Utilization in the Province of Rizal on February 24, 2016.

Furthermore, to enhance the services of the Institute, improvement of facilities such as the construction of fire exit, installation of CCTV, construction of the Automatic Weather Station (AWS) house, installation

of Automatic Irrigation System at the greenhouse and putting up of the Apiary project took place. Some enhancements such as the upgrading of the Soils and Water Laboratory facilities, repair of the Beekeeping Storage Room, extension of the Biocontrol Laboratory, and the rebuilding of the Native Pig pen and Native Chicken house are continuously being undertaken. Moreover, the Institute's research, extension and production activities produced various products such as organic fruits and vegetables, native pigs and chicken, and vermicast which were eventually sold to generate additional income for SANRI.





he extension activities of the University aimed at delivering services and expertise through various strategies, programs and transfer of technological innovations to various stakeholders in the fourteen (14) municipalities of Rizal province had sustained

the implementation of 31 on-going extension programs/projects to continuously serve the beneficiaries towards improving their quality of life. The implementation of these activities is a joint effort of the extension proponents, the University and the local government and other organizations. The University has provided financial support amounting to Php 2,039,793.00 to cover the cost of implementation of the said extension programs/projects for CY 2016. ## University Agriculture and Other Related Production Projects



side from income generated by the University of Rizal System from tuition and other fees, it also generated income from its agriculture and other related activities managed by the Production Unit, Sustainable Agriculture and Natural Resources Institute (SANRI).

The production unit has sustained the operation of animal and crop production projects which includes swine, cattle, goat, matured coconuts, coconut seedlings, fruits, taro, coffee berries and abaca. It also manages the production of bath and laundry soaps. These projects are meant to generate additional income for the university.

The college of Agriculture, on the other hand, has continuously maintained several agriculture production projects primarily to support instruction in the conduct of field laboratory activities of agriculture students. These projects are composed of the production of hydroponics crops, makapuno seed-

lings, bamboo cuttings, ornamentals, and high value crops.

Furthermore, complementary to its research and extension functions, the Sustainable

Agriculture and Natural Resources Institute (SANRI) produce several native pigs and chicken, organic fertilizers, and organic fruits and vegetables.



## **Enhancement of Agriculture and Fishery Production Projects**



he agriculture and fishery production projects of the university have been upgraded through the financial assistance given by CHED under the National Agriculture and Fisheries Education System (NAFES). The various project components include swine production, fingerlings produc-

tion, dairy goat production, and meat and milk processing. Faculty and staff members were sent to different trainings to upgrade their knowledge and skills in the management and operation of the said projects as well as to acquire skills in meat and milk processing.

The production unit also has constructed one unit of broiler house with one thousand (1,000)

heads holding capacity. This was funded by the University's internal operating budget.

These projects will surely boost the income generation activities of the University and will serve as avenues of field laboratory activities of the agriculture and fishery students.



#### **Budget Utilization**



he National Government earmarked PhP 448,577,064.24 to subsidize and support various programs and projects of the University of Rizal System. With the given budget allocation, the University was able to utilize 91.70% to cover the expenses on

personnel services, maintenance and other operating expenses, and capital outlay.

On the other hand, the financial subsidy provided by the government was augmented through the approval of the URS Board of Regents of the Internal Operating Budget of the University for CY 2016 amounting to PhP 299,085,193.98. This amount was allocated to

help defray the costs of the additional personnel services, maintenance and other operating expenses, and capital outlay. The University was able to utilize 62.15% of its Internal Operating Budget for the year.



he University has continuously committed itself in improving the delivery of services by way of procuring additional state-of-the-art laboratory and research equipment, outsourced services and purchase supplies and materials. For CY 2016, a total of Php 80,581,996.76 was utilized to defray the cost of the acquired equipment and supplies.

The budget amounting to Php 31,714,725.75 was taken from the Special Trust Fund (164) while Php 44,487,268.28 was appropriated in the GAA 101. A total of Php 4,380,002.73 from external agencies was used to fund the special projects (184).


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
